What Are The Risks?




- Phones and devices (such as tablets) are easily lost or stolen, and can be easily concealed.
- Devices often store a plethora of personal information, especially when you enable GPS features to various apps.
- Some applications are unsafe and can actually enable "phishing" or other malicious attacks.

How To Protect Your Mobile Security

- Use a random password to protect your device.
- Regularly update your operating system and backup the information on your device to your computer.
- Make sure that "https" appears in the address bar of your browser, which means connection is secure.
- Turn the Bluetooth function off after using it. It is another way unknown applications or viruses can access your cell phone.
- Be sure to use applications only from trustworthy and reputable sources.
- Know how to perform a remote wipe to remove data from your device if lost or stolen.



- Install a "phone finder" app that helps you find your device if it gets lost or stolen.
- Limit your activities while using



- Never give apps permission to remember your usernames or passwords; especially for banking or shopping apps.
- Call your service provider immediately if your phone becomes lost or stolen.

- The amount of malware (such as viruses) detected on devices in 2012 increased 44% from 2011.
- 95% of mobile malware has been invented within the last year.
- The majority of mobile malware is made for the Android operating system.
- You don't have to download anything to be a victim. Websites that are not secure can also steal your personal information, such as passwords.
